General

The Banks Peninsula Crags are home to rare species of geckos & native flora & fauna take care not to disturb wildlife or damage native plants, do not cut down any native trees or shrubs. Inclusion of any climbing area or climb in this guidebook does not mean that there is any R of public access.

Holmes Bay Crag is not very tall but comprises good quality rock. The crag faces south and can be cold & damp, more so in winter. The initial development here was by Murray Cullen in 1990 who started with 13 climbs, Pete Cleary added a couple followed by Joe Arts in 1991 & 1994. Alan Hill & his team visited in 1994,1998 & again in 2004 adding several climbs. The grades at the crag were pretty stiff & were revised in by Lindsay Main & Tim Wethey in their 2004 edition of South Island Rock, despite the revisions grades still seem a little stiff.

Climbing Notes

Climbing is Dangerous - By choosing to climb at these crags you must accept responsibility for your own personal safety, you must make your own decision regarding the condition of any fixed equipment. Neither the first ascensionists nor, the author accept any responsibility for the condition of any fixed equipment which is now around 30 years old. At this crag trad climbing skills & the ability to construct & equalise your anchors is essential. Respect the existing climbs, do not add bolts, when doing new climbs make sure you know where the existing lines are before getting your drill out. Routes are described from Left to Right. The route identifier at the bottom of each climb shown on the topos is normally that of the earliest recorded route.

As far as possible all known routes have been included in this guide. If you want to know where a route goes read the text as well as looking at the topos. The climbs are all short therefore route lengths are not shown. Climb with care, test all holds before you pull on them, check your placements & wear a helmet. It is a good idea to take a brush & clean the routes, it will be appreciated by the next visitor to the crag.

The following Abbreviations / Definitions have been used

Sp - Denotes Sport Route.

DBA – Denotes anchor station/lower off point

#Br - Denotes the number of bolt or chain links

Grading

The 'Ewbank Grading System' is not the best grading system when applied to mixed pro or 'boldly' bolted routes as it provides little in the way of information & are normally accepted as just the technical difficulty of a particular climb, it can be tricky to use these grading systems when trying to assess the actual seriousness of any climb.

The grades given here assume that the climber is climbing on-sight & placing gear on lead.

In this guide you will see a suffix to the grades (S1 - S3) this is to provide the climber with additional information on

the overall seriousness of the climb.

- S1 A straight forward climb with good protection & a low risk of injury from a fall.
- S2 Reasonable protection, but a fall could result in injury.
- S3 Protection is marginal or non-existent & a fall could result in serious injury.

Climbers should remember that this additional suffix to the grade is my opinion & in no way scientific, gear can fail, rock can fail & any fall can result in injury.


Access & Restrictions

Permission is required to access this crag; for access contact the owner Andy Richardson (Tel: 033046822). Unless you have permission to climb you cannot access this crag.

The crag located just off Double Bay, as you approach along Little Pigeon Bay Rd bear L at the fork. Go through the gate across the road by the stockyard & park about 250mts past them at a gate on the L, go through this gate & immediately L through a second gate. The rise to your south with some bush on top marks the summit of the crag, follow the fenceline to the saddle then turn L uphill following the top of the crag uphill towards the summit, a small cairn marks the top of the descent scramble. There is DBA at the top of 'The Hump Lump' which can be set up as a rap point for the day, otherwise descend to the east or west end of the crag.



Climbing

There is, reportedly, a bolt protected route on the right side of the crag, I failed to find it.

The first climbs are at the left side of the crag, on the climbers R of the descent scramble.

The next 2 climbs have a common start off a ledge 2mts up behind a native bush is, they are dirty & vegetated.

Not Shown on Topo. Climbs the 'V' groove that goes L from the ledge behind the native bush+

Head R from the ledge going up the L side of a pillar with some loose of blocks.



The dihedral with a ledge at 2mts, climb the groove to exit R & finish up the slab & wall above.

Around the R side of the pillar is good looking crack, climb the crack for 5mts after which it relents to an easy finish


A pod at 2.5mts marks the start, up the face to the pod finish following the widening crack.

The twin cracks with red lichen going R at the top into ${}^{\prime}CJ^{\prime}$, in reality a separate start to ${}^{\prime}CJ^{\prime}$.

A great looking crack line to an easy finish.




Start up the broken pillar to a ledge from the L or the R, easy exit via the widening crack. There are alternative starts described in the old guidebook, but the interpretation is difficult.

Bridge up to the roof, tricky moves to get up then tricky bridging to the ledge & a steep tricky finish.



Slightly to the R there are 2 broadleaf trees on a ledge system at about 3mts, there is a dead tree stump marking the start, Pn & ED have a common start up the wall to the left most tree.

It is a bit unclear as to where this line is, so I have shown the most logical line & assume it starts as for 'ED'. Start as 'ED' from the ledge with tree head up the curving groove system on the L.

ED Easy Day for an Ageing Alpine Faggot 10 S2 Tr 0Br Murray Cullen, 1990 Move up to the ledge & broadleaf behind the dead tree stump, wander up & rightwards across the ledge system to finish. Quite a bit of vegetation on this line.

Start at the steep crack with an open flared chimney (crux). This is both steeper and more strenuous than you expect. The crack continues up an open corner to a small bush below a sloping ledge. Easy finish to the top

The next lines are approx. 4mts R at a bay with triple cracks, there is a small broad leaf.





Not Shown on Topo. Located at the right-hand end, climb the V-corner L of a large block on the skyline.

Sarnia is a two-pitch climb which I assume is on the buttress pictured here.

This crag is located about 750mts due west of Holmes Bay Crag at GPS: -43.66001, 172.861499 (aprox).

From the car park this would be a 1.2km walk following the fence line, it is not clear if access to this crag is permitted.

- P1 Start below the steepest part of the cliff, where a wide groove leads to 2 prominent cracks, into the groove from the R & go into the L crack find a belay at the top of the crack.
- **P2** Move up and R to the V groove follow this to the top.
